### THE LADY LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER

Please join PWHS on October 22 at 7:00 p.m. in the Edison Room at Inventors Brewpub for our Speaker Series presentation of *Lady Lighthouse Keeper: The Extraordinary Life and Times of Georgia Green Stebbins* with Ken and Barb Wardius.

Georgia Green Stebbins was suffering from tuberculosis when she came to the North Point Lighthouse in Milwaukee from New York in the mid-1800s to help her ailing lighthouse-keeper father. She ended up being an exemplary lady lighthouse keeper in an era when that was an uncommon profession for women.



Georgia was the longest tenured keeper at North Point. Join Ken and Barb Wardius, authors of books like Wisconsin Lighthouses and North Point Lighthouse, as they shine a light on Georgia's incredible story. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m. after the members-only Annual Membership Meeting.

### **RESOURCE CENTER NEWS**

Since the establishment of the Port Washington Historical Society in 1991, the Society has been collecting items that reflect the history of the community. Many of these items went into furnishing the 1860 Light Station Museum. When the guest keeper program began in 2023, some of the Society items in storage went into

furnishing the lighthouse apartment that they stay in while serving as guest keepers.

Over the years, collected items not in use have been stored in a variety of places culminating in the 2023 purchase of a unit in Fredonia that the Society had been renting since 2013 to store a variety of items, many of them large. Items in Society collections are used in exhibits that the Society

Center where space has become more limited. Recently the Society has been given additional storage files, and more recently, new shelving purchased by the Society and donated by one of our volunteers.

Once the unit has been organized and the shelving constructed,

part of the Society's collections can be moved into the storage unit. Archival pieces currently stored in the basement of the Resource Center can be better stored at the Fredonia unit.

Several issues at the Fredonia storage unit exist, including the narrow and unsafe stairs to the loft area where we store chairs and smaller items. It is hoped that in the future the stairs can be replaced and the lighting

## PAINT ON PORT PROJECT CONTINUES

In April of 2023 a Midwest Mosaic Mural was hung on the north side of the Twisted Willow restaurant in downtown Port Washington. This was the first of several murals that have been painted in Port. Concrete retaining walls and plain brick walls have been transformed into works of art in the past two years. There is a history that accompanies each mural.

The mural recently finished on the retaining wall on East Jackson Street celebrates Port's maritime history. It features images of Native Americans, early settlers, the shipwreck Niagara, the Lighthouse on the pier, the fish shanties, a coal boat, and more.

The beautiful mural was painted by James Barany, a professor at the Milwaukee Institute of Art and Design. The mural was carefully laid out in a grid with each square assigned a part of the scene. The squares were painted one by one with the colors checked for accuracy. Barany used an undercoat and when finished, an overcoat to preserve the painting. To choose the images he researched the history of the town. He made the concrete retaining wall a palette that came to life.

Eileen Grace heads the Paint on Port project. She indicated that there will be five more murals painted with themes that highlight Port's history this year.


